

Continuing the tradition that started in the fall of 2015 when an emergency callout by several of the area local food pantries were in need of donations, former Mass Cruiser member Ralph Chadsey set up an annual program identifying five local food pantries that we could support on a shared rotating basis. Each year the collections of non-perishable food and cash donations has exceeded our expectations. Although we no longer weigh the food donations which typically weigh in at around nine tons during the cruise season, we are able to count the cash donations which for 2023 totaled almost \$31,000. This year the cash donations were distributed to the each of the five participating food pantries in three stages; checks for \$500 each in June, \$1,600 each in August and finally, I was happy to deliver \$4,080 to each Food Pantry this November following the our final October cruise. We want to express our thanks to the generous donations of over 9 tons of non-perishable food and \$30,900 in cash that our Bass Pro Shop cruise participants gladly donate to our dedicated front entrance team each cruise for the five participating Food Pantries in Foxboro, Attleboro, Wrentham, Walpole & Stoughton.

Malcom Pray Achievement Center Tour

International Motor Press Association (IMPA) Board Member David Fluhrer arranged a member tour of the Malcolm Pray Achievement Center and Museum in Bedford New York for Saturday November 18 which I, along with one allowed guest, my son Jim, attended, making this a "Tank-Away" Saturday, on the road at 7 AM, then back home at 4 PM. The Pray Achievement Center's purpose is to educate, and it offers educational programs designed to inspire students, the next generation of innovators and entrepreneurs, to start considering what career field they may want to pursue and to offer them Malcolm's "12 Steps of Success" to help them achieve their chosen path. School groups can participate in guided tours, workshops, and seminars that focus on the intersection of business and engineering. We watched a 2 minute video on the entrepreneurial life of Malcolm S. Pray Jr, narrated by the late Malcom himself followed by Museum Executive Director Marikay Satryano leading a guided tour of the two garages housing Malcolm's automobile collection. The collection ranges from an interesting and rare 1908 Metz Plan Car to some of Malcolm's own personal cars that he used until his passing in 2013 at age 84. Beyond the impressive collection of automobiles, the walls and display cases contain a lifetime of awards and more importantly, mementos and photographs of the young students who have benefited from Achievement Center programs. We concluded with an IMPA provided lunch in the Reception Center Library which houses an impressive automotive book collection. Jimmy and I left shortly after lunch to make the 160 mile ride back home for another 4 PM event.

TOOLS FOR KIDS Program Launched

In addition to our club's 50-50 efforts which supports workforce tool grants of \$250 each to graduating seniors in the four area Vocational/ Technical Automotive & Engine Trade programs, I am pleased to acknowledge the successful launch of TOOLS 4 KIDS this past cruise year. TOOLS 4 KIDS is a new Mass Cruisers program to collect functional automotive tools for graduating local area vocational, automotive students . We all have tools that we've upgraded or have more multiples than we need. Our goal is to collect and distribute functional basic tools to them. We collect tools at every Cruise or, for large amounts, we will pick them up. Every tool we get is donated



to students at no cost to the student. Students entering the work force need start up tools. Most automotive vocational students don't come from an automotive family so they have no hand-me-down access to tools. Every auto enthusiast has extra tools that are just cluttering their tool box or laying around unused. Kids can use them. We take them all. Rusty, dusty, kind of crusty, a tool is a tool. They'll all get a second life and help kids starting out. For our first year I'm pleased with the results of several sets of sockets, wrenches, about a hundred miscellaneous and specialty tools, including some unexpected Snap-On sets. Over the winter while you're tinkering with your rides start a bucket. Toss the oldies in and bring them to a cruise or meeting. I want to thank all this year's generous donors for giving us a great start.

The 50/50 Vocational Student Workforce grant program that provided \$250 cash awards to graduating seniors from four area Technical/Vocational schools, Blue Hills Regional, Tri-County, Norfolk County Agricultural and Southeastern Regional is being increased to \$400 grants, recognizing the increased costs associated of equipping these future technicians with the necessary tools their chosen trade requires.

November Guest Speaker: Jeff DeMarey

Our Guest Speaker series for the upcoming winter monthly meetings, that include pizza provided by the club for those of us that arrive hungry, got off to a great start with Jeff DeMarey, President of the Stonewell Insurance Group. Jeff, whose specialty insurance business was located in out in Wilbraham, became one of our Bass Pro Shops Cruise sponsors from 2014–2017 when the Mass Cruisers were one of the two host car clubs at the Goodguys Northeast Nationals during its five year run at the Big E in Springfield. However, insurance was not the topic at our meeting. It was his 501c3 charity, Springfield -Boston Education Foundation and its signature reincarnated event,



the annual historic Wilbraham Hillclimb. The <u>Springfield - Boston Education Foundation</u> mission is to educate children and young adults about the storage, repair, maintenance and skills it takes to drive collectible cars as well as publish technical and historical bulletins on the intricacies of these great automobiles.

What most of us weren't acutely aware of was that western Massachusetts back in the early days of automotive history was a hot bed of automotive manufacturers beginning in the late 1800's with the Knox in Springfield and Stevens-Duryea in Chicopee to the later well known classic American Rolls-Royce that was also built in Springfield in the 1920's. So there was a pipeline of newly manufactured automobiles being fed East from Springfield to Boston. And the mile long Monson Road hill, with its 23% grade, was used for unofficial hill climb testing these new brass era automobiles and motorcycles like the legendary Indians also manufactured in Springfield. The Automobile Club of Springfield began organizing the first hill climb event in 1908. It later went the way of those long gone manufacturers and was briefly reinstated again in 2013 for the town's 250th Anniversary. The Springfield - Boston Education Foundation, whose mission included picking up sponsoring the re-enactment of the historic Hillclimb five years ago, celebrated its 5th Annual event on May 13. Hillclimb participation is limited to pre-WWII vehicles from 1946 and older. Jeff's plans for the future to increase interest for both spectators and also attract auto enthusiasts, is to include a car show to be held nearby at the Wilbraham & Monson Academy 400 acre campus. This is an event club members may want to consider adding on to their annual calendar for May 11 & 12, 2024.
