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October 6 Cruise Winner: 1939 Mack ED Tow Truck

Victor Bernan from Weymouth has owned his 1939 Model ED Mack for 46 years but over the past 16 years started collecting parts to restore it to its original condition and also change it from its original flatbed configuration into a period correct Tow Truck. He undertook a three-year restoration of the cab and chassis and then later added a tow crane about two years ago. He also collected tools and equipment to fill the crane bed area to complete the period correct look-and-feel of a 1930's wrecker which made it a fitting cruise winning selection for a Vintage Motor Sports plaque.

One of the problems with these early Model ED Mack trucks, which were essentially a three-quarter ton vehicle, is with their three-speed tranny and 6.34 rear end gearing that was perfectly suited for 1930's road con-

ditions and speed limits, but a definite handicap today traveling to Foxborough from Weymouth with a maximum cruising speed in the 30-35 mph range, even over the back roads. Victor upgraded the tranny to a four-speed Warner and is now looking to find the matching gear set for either a 5.73 or 5.32 ratio rear end to improve his travel time to car events.
















October 6 Cruise Winner: 1964 Buick 225 Electra

Although Dan Horan, who hails from Brockton, has only owned his Wedgewood Blue 1964 Buick 225 Electra Convertible for three months, he had been mulling over buying it for about a year. It took an fortuitous incident while rooting around his barn. He pulled out a mint set of 1964 license plates still in their original RMV sleeves, and taking this as an omen, he didn't hesitate to contact its Alabama owner to bring the Buick to its new Massachusetts home and a Cruise Award winning plaque from Vintage Motorsports. The Buick 225 Electra's for 1964 came with upgrades from the previous years; 425 cid 360 HP, OHV, V8 w. 1 x4 bbl carb, dual exhaust and Super Turbine 400 transmission.












October 6 Cruise Winner: 1958 Custom Chevrolet

The first surprise after seeing Cumberland, RI resident Russell Klowan's highly customized and striking Salmon colored 1958 Chevrolet Pickup Truck is learning it was originally a Chevy Suburban that was cut and stretched some 25 – 30 years ago in Florida. The truck features many unique custom touches such as no chrome, the slanted Nomad style rear tailgate with the exhaust tips coming through the bumper, the rear quarter air intake slits, a fully custom built dash and of course that beautiful smooth engine bay, home to a big block 409 V8. The side quarter graphics are a tribute to seven-time NASCAR champion Dale Earnhardt's #3 as well. Russell first saw the truck at the Daytona Turkey Run then again a year later where it was for sale at the Fall Carlisle Show, and that was when he decided to buy it. Since then he has tried unsuccessfully to track down the build history, however the quality of the truck's workmanship was worthy of being recognized with a Vintage Motorsports Award plaque without knowing who its creator was.





October 6 Cruise Winner: 1932 LaSalle Town Sedan

Ken Bourque purchased his 1932 LaSalle Town Sedan nine years ago after selling his 1919 Dodge Brothers Roadster. It was Ken's wife Barbara that picked it out for him from a picture in Hemmings when she thought it could fill that empty garage spot formerly occupied by the Roadster. This LaSalle was originally purchased by an 85 year old mechanic of a San Antonio private collector of some 30 to 40 cars that he maintained for its late owner. It was his favorite car in the collection that included Duesenberg's and Packard's. When the mechanic turned 90 he knew it was time to let it go to another caretaker. Along came Barbara and Ken's LaSalle was able to garner a Vintage Motorsports Award plaque at tonight's cruise. The LaSalle was the lower cost companion brand of Cadillac that was introduced in 1927 and was continued to be built by Cadillac up until 1940. LaSalle's actually outsold Cadillac as it was competing with the Packard 120's, so it was a surprise to LaSalle owners when it was dropped from production in 1941.















October 6 Cruise Winner: 1963 Ford Econoline Truck

Ron Keogh's custom 1963 Ford Econoline pickup's Camaro green with added flake finish really pops in the afternoon sun. It also was popular with the kids at our annual Halloween cruise with animated costumed characters that were activated when stomped on a foot switch. Ron built the truck in his home two stall garage over two winters five years ago. Two things inspired him, incorporating 1960 era custom touches like the '60 Impala instrument gages in the cab and rolled & pleated white vinyl interior in both the cab and truck bed side walls. How about the 120 louvred rear tailgate & nerf bars up front? Powered with a Ford 302 V8, C4 tranny & '63 Mercury 9 inch rear the 1960's vibe continues. Ron's pickup was one of the 200 invited customs to participate in the 2018 Hot Wheels 50th Anniversary Legends Tour in New Jersey and now a 2022 Vintage Motorsports Award cruise winning selection thanks to Kelly Hines and Heather.











October 20 Cruise Winner: 1939 Chevrolet Flatbed

Ed Clark drove his 1939 Chevrolet VD 1 1/2 Ton Flatbed hauling the 1939 John Deere Model L Tractor with an attached Harrow on the flat bed from his Seekonk home up to our Bass Pro Shops cruise. He must have enjoyed the opportunity exposing the typical workday commuters on their way home today with an amazing piece of pre-WWII rolling farm history. Keeping up with today's traffic is not a problem either with a supercharged 496 V8 and 4L80E auto tranny driving its GM 14-bolt dually rear axel. Ed has owned the Chevy for 16 years taking 8 years to do all the restoration work himself. Having worked on a farm in his younger days, he also undertook searching for a period correct 1939 John Deere Tractor to compliment the truck/tractor package vision he had in mind. Seeing plenty of early 1940's available, he finally found this 1939 Model L in Pennsylvania that required two years to restore. 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October 20 Cruise Winner: 1957 Ford Ranchero

Back in the day, Ford Model T and Model A pickup trucks were created by placing a pickup box behind the roadster body. Ford Australia's designer modified a coupe with an integrated loadbed body in 1934 that could be driven to church on Sunday or deliver produce or animals to market during the week. This coupe utility was popularly called a "UTE", a favorite crossword puzzle word. In America, Hudson produced a pickup truck based on their Hudson Super 6 from 1942 to 1947. It wasn't until 1957 when Ford resurrected the coupe utility idea with the Ranchero pickup truck based upon the two-door ranch station wagon and short-wheelbase Custom sedan claiming it as "More Than a Car! More Than a Truck!" Jack Alaimo's 1957 black Ford Ranchero is great example of this First Generation (1957-1959) full size coupeutility pickup that continued in compact and mid-sized form for over 20 years. Jack saw this Ranchero for sale two years ago after the previous owner of 15 years passed away. It has the 312 V8 and 3-speed standard shift and had FOR SALE signs posted on both the windshield and rear window.





October 20 Cruise Winner: 1955 GMC 100 4 x 4 Truck

When I asked Steve Sullivan, who hails from nearby Walpole, how long he owned his 1955 GMC 100 4 x 4 Truck he said, "15 years". When I asked how long he took to restore it to its current show quality finish, he said 2 years, 2 months and 4 days after beginning the process like many COVID projects that were started in 2020. Although the restoration isn't yet 100% complete, they never really are, his Jimmy was

worthy of season ending Vintage Motorsports Award plaque. What also makes this particular GMC unique is that it has a NAPCO 4 x 4 conversion kit which, in 1955, could be ordered from GM and installed with very few modifications to the chassis; and with their "shift on the fly" transfer case and dual range, in what was predominantly the two-wheel light truck world of the 1950's, you could have a versatile and

durable <u>"mountain goat"</u> of a truck for the bargain price of an additional \$1,250—\$1,500.

Rich Strauss (L) from Westwood is one of those auto enthusiasts that have a hard time keeping the number of cars he can garage at one time manageable, but when another gem comes along he can't resist jumping at becoming the car's next caretaker. Such was the fate of Rich's latest unusual find, a 1950 Chrysler Town & Country Station Wagon RestoRod of only one week under his ownership. The only clue one has this is no ordinary Town & Country were the give-away American Racing wheels, 16 inch up front and 18 inch wheels out back, with telltale disc brakes peeking out. The interior also looks original period correct, but lift the hood and see the Mopar 423 Wedge that's connected to a 700 R4 tranny with a 10 bolt rear and you know this is something special; another reason why this Chrysler was selected for a Vintage Motorsports cruise award plaque, not just because Mike Rabbitt (R) happens to prefer Chrysler's.















Oct. 20 Cruise Winner: 1949 Chevrolet Fastback

Rick and Barbara LaSalle from Cumberland, RI have only had their custom 1949 Chevrolet Deluxe Fleet-line Fastback two-door sedan for a couple of weeks now but it has several unusual features that make it one interesting street sleeper. First is the most obvious custom feature, the triple 1959 Cadillac bullet tail-lights. Second, and hidden from view in the trunk is a Bluetooth communications system that provides, radio, smart phone communications and GPS tracker features. Under the hood is the sleeper part, a big block 454 V8 coupled to a TH 400 tranny. While looking inside at the custom leather interior of the pre-bucket seat era bench seat cars of the 1950's, and noticing that the simple addition of an interior color matching bench seat console with cup holders, how these pre and post war cars can be easily and inexpensively transformed into comfortable long distance highway cruisers. 1949 was a significant styling year for all the General Motors cars as body designs dramatically changed from the pre and post WW-II

designs to streamlined notch-back and fastback styles. This Chevy De Luxe Fleetline fastback design was new and very popular then and still is with collectors. This was another great selection for our final season cruise Vintage Motorsports award plaque that Club Photographer Steve Vining (R) selected.













October 20 Cruise Winner: 1952 Chevrolet Bel Air

Wally Hayes, leader of the Old Koots Car Club out of Norwood, is well known for owning some very nice and interesting cars and, with a few of them taking home deserving Vintage Motorsports Cruise award plaques over the years. His 1952 Chevrolet BelAir resto-rod is no exception. Wally has owned it for a year now having added some 3,000 miles to the 1,000 miles since the original build. He commented that this is one of the nicest cars he has owned. It was built by the former Kentucky owner, originally for himself, from a car that had been in storage since 1969. He built it over 14 months straight full time, only farming out the paint PPG Gulf Blue & Fontana Grey two-tone paint and matching grey leather custom interior and upholstery work to Pro Custom Interiors in Knoxville, TN. The resto-rod was executed perfectly hiding a

former 2008 Silverado LS1 V8 under the hood and with a 4L60E four-speed tranny which Wally was able to average 23.6 mpg when he drove it to the Syracuse Nationals and back. The Mustang II front end, 15" Ridler Wheels, radials, P.S. & P.B. makes handling on the highway a breeze.













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
