




October 20 Whitehall Auto Sales Shop Tour

Tucked in between I-495 and the I-90 Mass Pike in Hopkinton is Whitehall State Park and its namesake Reservoir. Along the reservoir's western shoreline is Spring Street off Rte. 135, a back road less travelled and where I've lived for 30 years. A mile and half away from my home was one interesting antique auto restoration shop where I would stop on occasion to talk with its friendly and informative owner Tom White when I spotted an interesting car parked outside. It didn't take too many recent visits before realizing this was a road trip shop tour my fellow Mass Cruisers members would appreciate and be interested in doing. So, on October 20 a dozen club member cars gathered at the Whitehall State Park parking lot to cruise on over to Tom White's Whitehall Auto Restoration around the corner on Spring Street. Tom not only had some awesome restorations in the shop, but also had very informative background stories he shared about each of the cars they were working on. Fortunately, despite limited parking on the property, parking along Spring Street was not a problem on this road less traveled from its busy feeder highway, Rte. 135.

Walking up to the main barn past Tom's daily driver 1964 Buick Riviera Gran Sport and peeking out the garage open doors were three sets of vehicle taillights, a 1955 Chrysler 300 prototype finishing up a full nut and bolt rotisserie restoration behind Tom's Riviera and next door a fully restored 1955 Chrysler New Yorker convertible in striking two-tone dark imperial green and gold paint and its stall mate, a 1957, Chrysler 300 in striking Gauguin Red (see page 6). As the club members split into two groups, one around the '55 New Yorker with Tom Sr. and the others around the '55 Prototype 300 with Tom Jr. we were treated with a running story on each of these cars and later on the other half dozen or so projects the shop

The most exciting project being worked on at Whitehall was the 1955 prototype Chrysler 300 which was being restored for legendary Mike McCandless's museum collection https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=2NebbVd4s5k in Burlington, NC and was destined to be unveiled at the November 19 Muscle Car & Corvette Nationals in Chicago. Mike happens to be the son of legendary Herb "Mr. 4 Speed" McCandless who drove for Ronnie Sox & Martin becoming the first to record NHRA National Event wins in both Pro and Sportsman eliminators in the same season. Some of the unique challenges Tom faced restoring this car back-to-factory-original prototype standards was finding original 1955 Chrysler 300 parts and no longer manufactured OEM parts like the tires. They have another 1955 300 parts car in the yard and for the racing tires used in the first prototype, Tom showed us the steel die they made to mold the original race tire information on the new replacement black-wall tires. All the work except for paint and plating is done in their shop, and that includes making up the new wire harnesses to match the original look and color codes.

As beautiful as all the 1950's era Chrysler Motors vehicles are on the outside, seeing what was under the hood is even more exciting for auto enthusiast gear heads. The 1955 Chrysler New Yorker's 331 cu. in. HEMI engine sporting dual 4 bbl carbs with air cleaners and painted in the matching body color gold finish along with the 1957 300C 392 cu. in. HEMI with a totally different air intake setup for the

dual 4 bbl carbs were treats to behold. The workshop building in back also housed a pair of 1957 Ford Thunderbirds, one finished and the second in primer getting ready for paint so, it isn't all about MOPAR's, it's more about quality restoration projects large and small. Continued on Page 7





Barrett-Jackson Guest Speaker



Fred Tierney introduced Guest Speaker Michael Tramontano, one the four Barrett-Jackson Auction Company's Outreach Consignment Specialists, at our November monthly meeting. Some of us were able to enjoy the Barrett-Jackson experience as spectators for their Mohegan Sun auctions in CT before they their schedule five year run was shortened due to the 2020 COVID shutdown. What made Michael's talk for club members and guests so interesting was that he focused from the perspective of a potential car owner considering consigning their precious "baby" to one of their four yearly auctions, now NO RESERVE, at Scottsdale AZ in January, Palm Beach, FL in April, Las Vegas in June and either Houston again or possibly Nashville in October. Using this past January Scottsdale auction experience, Mike detailed the steps he took as the consignment facilitator from first contact with a potential consignee through submitting the preliminary consignment request form, the valuation process, to placement in the auction schedule and finally being in the staging line to the vehicle's 2 minutes of fame on the main stage for the actual auction.

That big January 2022 Scottsdale AZ auction experienced a 100% sell through rate for 1,841 vehicles and 1,153 pcs. of automobilia earning a total of \$202.2 million. There were over 6,000 registered bidders for this auction which accounts for this event being billed as the world's greatest classic car auction. The best part is you can go online to see all the past auction results or, if you can't attend the Barrett-Jackson experience in person, watch all their actual auctions being live broadcast on online. Thank you Mike for an informative presentation.



2022 Food Pantry Drive Results

The generosity of car owners and spectators attending our Bass Pro Shops cruises at Patriot Place continued in spectacular fashion to support donating to the five participating food pantries during our ten 2022 cruise dates. The final season cruises ending on October 24 finished with a total of \$23,331.50 in cash donations collected by our front entrance team members in addition to over 9 tons of non-perishable food for the year. As is our practice, we presented each of the participating food pantries with checks of \$2,250 in August and the final round of checks for \$2,866.30 each were presented to representatives of the Hebron Food Pantry (Attleboro), Wrentham Food Pantry, St. Anthony's Free Market (Stoughton), at our November 15 monthly meeting in time to meet the increasing needs for the deserving families they serve ahead of the Thanksgiving holiday season. Representatives from the Foxboro Food Pantry and Walpole Community Food Pantry were unable to attend the meeting and were presented their checks at one of their open pantry dates, pictured below.

Club Treasurer Kevin Rushlow also noted several other club charitable program donations that were made this past year, namely the Amvets \$507–50/50 proceeds, \$1,000 for the new Vocational School Workforce Grants of \$250 each to Norfolk Agricultural, Blue Hills Regional, South Eastern Reginal and Tri-Valley Regional Technical/Vocational Schools that Rick White instituted as part of the clubs 50-50 program and finally for the first time a \$700 sponsorship for a Fall River Little League baseball team when their program experienced losing several financially impacted sponsors due to the COVID shutdown

I personally want to express my gratitude to all our club members who made each of our 2022 cruise nights such a success; our site host Patriot Place, their traffic control staff and security personnel, our Mass Cruisers team of front entrance member volunteers, the Bass Pro Shops sponsorship, our D.J. Crusin' Bruce and especially the car owners and spectators that make this cruise event so special and who donate every cruise. I hope everyone has a safe and healthy winter and I can't wait to get started again next spring. See you all there.

M.A.A.C. Update: Inspection Sticker Change

On its surface the new RMV rule that went into effect on Tuesday November 1, 2022, for our annual vehicle safety inspections was to close a much loved 13 month loophole. Motor vehicles passing required inspections will get a new sticker, valid for one year, with the month the last sticker expired seemed to be targeting a practice by some Bay State car owners that were trying to extend an additional free month or two beyond the normal 12-month vehicle safety inspection cycle. Those owners will no longer get a sticker displaying the month the inspection occurred, but the month the last inspection occurred. So a May expired sticker car will get a May new sticker no matter when inspected past the original monthly deadline.

The problem for antique and collector car owners whose vehicles are undergoing extensive restoration or long-term repairs resulting in their vehicles not being ready for its regularly scheduled annual inspection is more troubling. Having inspection stickers that expired in a previous calendar year are facing a more perplexing problem with this new rule. Previous year inspected vehicles will receive a January sticker of the current year the vehicle is being inspected, no matter the month the vehicle is inspected. You can imagine the consequences collector vehicle owners will be facing if they now have a January inspection sticker. This change does not impact the requirements for newly purchased vehicles which must be inspected within seven days of the vehicle registration date, and they will receive a sticker of the month which it was inspected and is valid for one year. Of course, this could also mean you may want to avoid purchasing an antique or collector vehicle during the winter months.



M.A.A.C. is already hearing complaints as it could require owners to violate the law every year when they take then out of winter storage to get their car inspected in the spring.
