

The clubs 50/50 Workforce Grant program for the four Tech-Voc schools we support also did fairly well. Keeping this in mind, and that there is only so much extra money people have to donate, the 50/50 crew did a great job soliciting donations from participants willing to support this great cause. All of this wouldn't be possible if it wasn't for the work of the "setup and parking" crew volunteers. Several of our members start the day as early as noon time. It starts by contacting Bass Pro to bring the trailer up and once it is in place they start putting out all the traffic cones, setting up the tables around the trailer and all of the signage needed to keep the traffic flowing smoothly. If my notes are correct, we missed three cruise nights. One to a Patriots preseason game and one to a rain cancellation. Another early spring cruise experienced uncomfortable weather with poor turnout that the 50/50 and food pantry collections were suspended with no cruise winner selection as well. Not making up some cancellations was not a bad thing. Having to put on this cruise two weeks in a row would have been a lot to ask of the membership and having a few weeks off to recharge the batteries and support other area cruises was a good thing. Thank you to every member who has shown up to help at these cruise nights. Without your commitment we would not have been able to put on one of the biggest and best run cruise nights anywhere.

Just because the cruise nights are over that doesn't mean cruise season is over. The club has two events planned for the coming weeks. On November 4th Fred Tierney has organized a tour of a private collection at the Piston Palace. Because the owner limits tours to only 10 at a time. October 5 Cruise Winner #1: 1962 Chevrolet Biscayne



It was a underwent a 3½ year total body off nut and bolt restoration in Virginia that was completed in 2018. The original was a sad green and fawn colored 6 cylinder with three on the tree. While still retaining the red 1962 Biscayne interior, it was rebuilt using a 1964 chassis, all new hardware and is rolling on 18-inch U.S. Mag wheels making it a much better driving and handling classic for today's cruising needs.

Scott Peter from Franklin, MA has owned his 1960 Chevrolet Impala for 29 years and has over time been making continuous improvements, the latest being a total refinish two years ago of the white vinyl interior to its current striking red diamond stitched seating and door panels painted to match the red trimmed white paint finish. 1960 Impala's unique horizontal bat/gull-wing fins were Chevy's last hurrah in the battle of the fin design era that was started by GM Design Chief Harley Earl started in 1948 with the Cadillac.



One of the most striking features in Scott's Chevy when you look inside the cabin is the brilliant red diamond patterned seats & door panels and learn they were painted with durable upholstery paint used for boating seats.

X H.3433 (HD.427) An Act relative to duplicate license plates

Allowing NO duplicate license plates - this would kill the Year of Manufacture Plate.

William M. Straus 10th Bristol—Steven S. Howitt (Representative) – Fourth Bristol -Norton: Precincts 1, 2; Rehoboth; Seekonk; Swansea: Precincts 4, 5.—Angelo L. D'Emilia 8th Plymouth

Hearing was held on 10/02/23 and Testimony and a Position Paper AGAINST the passage of this bill was submitted

Winterize Your Car: A Checklist for Getting Your Vehicle Ready for the Snowy Season



Ensure battery is charged
Replace windshield wipers
Have sufficient windshield wiper fluid
Check anti-freeze and coolant levels
Keep gas tank full to avoid condensation from forming and freezing
Assemble emergency kit- first aid, jumper cables, flashlight, flares, blanket, coolant, oil
Keep snow tools in car- snow brush, windshield scraper, shovel, gloves
Check air pressure and wear on tires, replace with winter tires if necessary
Make sure all lights work, including hazards
Check that heat and defroster work
Check exhaust system for leaks
Check oil level
Ensure steering works, and replace power steering fluid if necessary
Test your brakes
Make you have enough brake fluid
